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Internship Information

This packet includes information pertaining to Days End Farm Horse Rescue's Equine Care & Rehabilitation Internship Program, as well as paperwork needed for the application process. Please read through the entire packet and, if you decide to apply, pay close attention to all sections that are needed for your application. All information pertains to the residential option, unless stated otherwise.

Program Goal

The goal of this program is to encourage careers in equine management, veterinary care, advocacy, rescue, and rehabilitation.

Program Description

Days End Farm Horse Rescue's Internship Program is designed to immerse participants in the daily operations of a non-profit horse rescue by giving them a unique opportunity to work with neglected and abused horses seized by Animal Control agencies. Through education and interaction, students gain experience working with equine professionals and the public throughout the rescue and rehabilitation process. Interns can expect to gain significant equine husbandry experience, recognize equine cruelty and neglect, receive training in basic rehabilitation, and learn about horse psychology and its application in everyday handling and training.

This program is tailored to those seeking careers in equine management, horse rescue and rehabilitation, and equine veterinary services. Interns can expect to work with a population of 50-90 horses, a knowledgeable and friendly staff, and dedicated volunteers. Participants will spend most of their time at our main facility, but will travel occasionally to our satellite facility, as well as off-site clinics, and events as scheduled. We offer both residential (paid) and non-residential (unpaid) options.

DEFHR Intern Job Description

Responsibilities

- General care and management of our entire equine population, including but not limited to:
 - o Feed management (preparing and distributing)
 - o Medicating (identifying and interpreting common medical conditions, administering basic medical care, etc.)
 - o Working with the veterinarian, farrier, and dentist on a regular basis
 - o Assisting with the care, management, and oversight of critical care horses (rehabilitation, colic watch, sling care, etc.)
- Maintaining the facility in a clean, orderly, and safe manner, including but not limited to:
 - o Basic barn chores (mucking stalls and paddocks, cleaning/filling waters, etc.)
 - o Sweeping, raking, and de-cobwebbing barns and paddocks
 - o Minor facility maintenance and repair
 - o Organization of barn and public areas
- Daily interactions with staff, volunteers, and the public, including but not limited to:
 - o Communicating with staff to report the status of a horse or task, receive constructive feedback or instruction, or relay information from a volunteer
 - o Coordinating volunteers to match them with the appropriate tasks
 - o Give tours, receive donations, and assist the public
 - o Assist with enforcing farm rules and safety guidelines on a regular basis
- Public speaking
 - Presenting a pre-made PowerPoint presentation after the end of the internship session in order to receive a Certificate of Completion for the internship session.

Internship FAQ

**Are interns required to be vaccinated against COVID-19?

Residential interns are required to be fully vaccinated prior to their arrival to our farm. We make this a requirement due to the fact that residential interns are traveling from multiple locations, sometimes internationally, to get here and are then living in very close quarters. If you have an issue with getting vaccinated against COVID-19, you may contact us to discuss further.

What is the area like around Days End Farm?

Days End Farm Horse Rescue is an equine rescue facility located on 58 rolling acres in Woodbine, Maryland. Woodbine is a rural area, with gorgeous country views and farms as far as the eye can see. Within a couple miles of our farm, you can find a grocery store, restaurants, a gym, gas stations, a general store, and local shops. Even though we are in a rural area, we are close to more urbanized areas with plenty of things to do. Baltimore is approximately 30 minutes away, and Annapolis and Washington, DC are approximately 45 minutes to an hour away.

What kind of weather should I expect?

Maryland experiences all four weather seasons, although they can be unpredictable. Precipitation varies between wet and dry spells. Some years are wetter/dryer than others. Whether or not we get snow in the winter is based on temperatures. Each session's average weather are as follows:

- <u>Spring session</u> = 41°F average temperature (but can get into single digits), our farm tends to be very windy during these months.
- <u>Summer session</u> = 71° average temperature (but can get into triple digits), very humid.
- <u>Fall session</u> = 51° average temperature, vary between wet and dry.

What should I bring?

It is important to bring clothing and footwear suitable for the time of the year that you will be interning. You will need clothes to keep you warm and dry in the winter and cool in the summer. Rain gear is also important as you will be working in wet conditions. Pack a couple pants and sweatshirts in the summer or t-shirts in the winter, since the weather can be unpredictable. Sturdy, waterproof footwear is extremely important as you will be doing a lot of walking while you work. A professional/dress attire outfit should also be brought for attending events such as group tours, clinics, and other outings. Casual clothes should be brought for your days off. If you are approved to ride, riding apparel will also be needed (ie-boots, helmets, chaps, etc.). Please try to bring at least a week's supply of clothes to cut down on the amount of laundry that you will be doing.

Sunscreen and a water bottle are advised year-round to prevent sunburn and dehydration, as most of your work will be performed outdoors. Residential interns get \$100 per week, so be sure to bring extra money with you. Cell phones and laptops are permitted and WiFi is available.

Your Participant Release Form will be sent to you via email prior to your arrival. Please make sure to fill it out in its entirety so you can hand it in when you arrive. You need to have your social security number handy so you can fill out your W9 and start receiving your stipend. Please also bring a valid driver's license.

**What are the accommodations for residential interns? Is food provided?

Interns live onsite in a cozy bedroom inside our main office (farmhouse). They have access 1.5 bathrooms, a full kitchen and laundry facilities. You will share the room and house with 1 other intern during your stay. We require that living quarters, both private and shared, be kept clean during the entirety of your stay. DEFHR supplies all furnishings, cooking supplies, bedding, and towels. For entertainment purposes, a smart TV equipped with a loaded Amazon Fire Stick is provided. Your personal login must be used for the included apps, which we will confirm have been logged out upon your departure.

Food is not provided. Residential interns receive a \$100 weekly stipend, which is intended to cover food expenses. A weekly trip to the grocery store and bank can be made available, if needed.

Do I need to be currently enrolled in a college or university to participate?

No – we only require that you be at least 18 years of age, and possess an interest and enthusiasm for learning about the services that Days End Farm has to offer.

What times are available to intern?

Specific dates for each session can be found on our website by going to www.defhr.org and clicking on the GET INVOLVED tab.

**How soon before my start date can I move in?

The Friday/Saturday prior to your starting day is when we ask that you move in, which will allow you to get unpacked and settled before starting work the next day.

**Do I need to bring a car?

You do not need a car, although you are welcome and encouraged to bring one. Keep in mind that there is no public transportation available in the area. Your staff supervisor will arrange for transportation to and from the airport if necessary. Farm vehicles, or carpooling with staff/volunteers, are available for essential errand runs only.

What will my schedule be like?

<u>Residential Applicants</u>: Generally, you will be working Monday-Friday, 8am-5pm with a 1-hour lunch break, and Saturdays, 8am-12pm. Situations may arise outside of your normal hours, such as night feedings, critical care watches, emergencies, and new horse arrivals, for which you will be expected to assist. Should you need to work outside of your normal hours, every effort will be made to adjust your schedule to compensate.

Non-Residential Applicants: Your schedule can be flexible, but we ask that you visit the farm at least 2-3 days/week. You are required to work at least three hours each time you come to Days End Farm. Keep in mind that the amount of time that you put into the internship determines the amount of experience you will gain. In order to officially complete your internship and receive a Certificate of Completion, you will need to work at least 300 hours during your interning session.

**How many hours per week will I work?

You will be consistently work 44+ hours per week. More hours may be required during emergencies and impoundments.

Am I allowed to bring my own horse?

No – Days End is limited in space and manpower, so we strictly reserve spaces in our herd for horses from Animal Control. Due to shared housing, no animals are permitted inside the intern house.

Is smoking allowed on the premises?

There is a designated outdoor smoking area for staff and interns. No smoking is permitted anywhere else on the property.

Who will I be working with?

You will also be working closely with staff, volunteers, interns, and various equine professionals.

Will I be able to work with the veterinarian and farrier?

Yes – the vet is typically scheduled at least once per week and the farrier once every other week. Our farm is set up to treat critical care patients. We have a great working relationship with our vet and farriers, and will give you every opportunity we can to observe them.

Will I be involved with educational work?

Yes – Days End has approximately 1,000 individuals who volunteer each year and even more who visit. Education is a core component and as an intern you will have many opportunities to educate the public on proper equine care and treatment. Volunteers and visitors gain valuable hands-on training from our interns.

Will I be involved in riding and training the horses?

Possibly – Training is a large portion of the rehabilitation process, however the extent of the training that you will be doing during your internship is based on your experience level, horse availability, workload and the availability of our staff trainers. While we put great effort toward educating our interns about the training practices we use at Days End, training is not a key component of the Equine Care & Rehabilitation Internship. If the main reason for wanting to intern is to train and/or ride, please consider applying to our Training Internship on the website.

Will I be involved in horse rescues and impoundments in the field?

Maybe – Days End has a strong partnership with Animal Control agencies in Maryland and throughout surrounding states. Impoundments and rescues are sporadic and often unexpected, so there is no guarantee that you will be able to participate in one during your time with us. However, should one arise, we will make every effort for you to be able to come along and observe/assist.

Interns will also get the unique experience of attending an off-site equine assessment within our Owner Assistance Program. DEFHR assists owners with safely rehoming their horses into new homes, part of which involves visiting the horse and owner to get information, photos and videos needed to get them listed. Interns attend these appointments with a DEFHR staff to assist with scribing and videography. This opens up the opportunity to meet various horses and owners, as well as to see more of our great state of Maryland.

Is there anything I should do before my arrival?

Yes, there are some things that you should focus on prior to your arrival:

- Research Days End Farm Horse Rescue by viewing our website at www.defhr.org.
- Familiarize yourself with the anatomy and physiology of the horse.
- Research some common medical ailments in horses (ie thrush, abscesses, colic, etc) and their signs, symptoms, and general treatments.
